<b>Fall of Constantinople</b>	1453	<i>Christian Byzantium Muslim Ottoman Vying for Constantinople Fourteen-53 Connie fell to her knees Because of Mo 2's gun-oples</i>
<b>Gutenberg Prints the Bible</b>	1456	<i>John Goot Gave books a toot! And determined to make print bet-ta Moveable type Gave a Bible hype In 14-fifty-six-ta</i>
<b>The Inquisition (Spain)</b>	1478	<i>Pit and Pendulate Fourteen-78 Ferd and Iss (Catholics) Using political power tricks Cleansing Spain (weary, worn) From Jew, Muslim and Reform</i>
<b>Columbus Sails to the New World</b>	1492	<i>In fourteen-92 Columbus sailed the ocean blue On Mary, Nina, Pinta-lou But post-4 trips, still had no clue he hadn't reached the Indies.</i>
<b>Martin Luther Begins the Reformation</b>	1517	<i>One-five-one-seven Now the Reformation's treadin' Luther and his 95 Clung to gratia, Sola-fide Wouldn't recant in '21 The Reformation had begun.</i>

<b>Jamestown is Founded in Virginia</b>	1607	<i>Jamestown in sixteen-oh-7 Was going to be almost like heaven Two year's time was found in wantus Smith and Rolfe and Pocahontas.</i>
<b>13 Colonies Formed</b> Virginia---Massachusetts---New Hampshire---New York---Maryland---Connecticut---Rhode Island---Delaware---North Carolina---New Jersey---South Carolina---Pennsylvania---Georgia	1607-1733	<i>Sixteen-oh-7 England's own To further the glory of her throne Commerce checked By laws and pacts Called the Navigation Acts.</i>

<b>First Continental Congress Seeks Peace with Britain</b>	1774	<i>Seventeen seventy-four ess When Continental Congress Said "no" to British trade unless British rights we possess.</i>
<b>The War for Independence (aka American Revolution)</b>	1775-1783	<i>On 1 and 7-7-5 Watched from the church's tall "high dive" Paul and Dawes both saw the light And minute-men put Brits to flight.</i>
