Sample logic questions 🧐:

- What are the strengths and weaknesses of the democratic, aristocratic, and monarchical forms of government, and to what type of countries and people are they best suited? Please show us what you learned – this is not a short answer question – think a short paragraph for each type of government with a nice intro and conclusion 😊
- What are the main differences between the Articles of Confederation and the U.S. Constitution?
- How did the Pilgrims initially plan to make sure that no members of the colony starved? What did the Pilgrims discover about this arrangement (II.4)? What solution did the Pilgrims develop to solve their dilemma (II.4, 5)?
- How did the Westminster Assembly say that God reveals Himself? Compare/contrast the different ways (include the two main types of revelation and how each is viewed by believers – what do believers agree on and what do they not agree on with respect God's revelation, and how extra-biblical revelation should be viewed).

Tips:

- We don't expect you to know every last detail of every book – but when all is said and done we want you to be able to articulate why each book is significant
- Establish a study schedule for yourself and stick to it!

Please recall that this course counts as Doctrine, History, and Literature. The final will be comprehensive and fair, but it will not be easy -- it merits significant serious study. If you plan accordingly, you will do well and demonstrate how much you have learned! Treat it lightly and your great will be reflective. We are excited for you to finish well!
